**Resources: Serial Publications** 

Serial publications - magazines, journals, newsletters, newspapers, annuals - are an excellent place to find up-to-date information. In addition, serial publications from Southeast Asian community organizations and publishers are a first-hand source on issues and concerns that specifically relate to a particular group. Serial publications not only are vital for current researchers, they also can serve as a record of the past for future students and scholars. The Southeast Asian Archive is fortunate to have an extensive collection of serial publications, over 260 titles. The holdings vary from complete runs to a single issue per title. The majority are published in the United States, but also represented are publications from Australia, Canada, France, Japan, Germany, Great Britain, New Zealand, Denmark, Switzerland, and Thailand. Over 60% of the titles are Vietnamese language, and approximately 20% are English language. The remainder are Khmer, Laotian, Hmong, or bilingual.

The core of the collection comes from Paul Tran, a UCI alumnus. In connection with his association with Viet Nam Hai Ngoai magazine, and his activities with organizations concerned with the refugee camps, he amassed a collection of newsletters, magazines and other publications from Vietnamese refugee and immigrant groups, not only in the United States, but from other countries as well. Included are publications from student and religious groups, organizations concerned with social services, politics, culture preservation, the refugee camps, representing Vietnamese in the United States, as well as abroad.

In addition, the Archive has been fortunate to receive a number of magazines and journals on a regular basis as donations to the Archive. Included in this category are Van Hoc, Duoc Tu Bi, Khmer Conscience, Hop Luu, Nhan Quyen, Non Song, Quang Phuc, Thong Luan, Viet Nam Hai Ngoai, Vietnam Thoi Bao. We are indeed grateful to the publishers of these periodicals for their contributions.

The Archive also is on the mailing list of a number of organizations and receive their newsletters. Some of these titles are Amerasian Update, Vietnam Insight, Aid to Refugee Children Without Parents, Vietnamese Community of Orange County Newsletter, IRIC Newsletter, INSCAN/InternationalSettlementCanada-Research Resource Division for Refugees, Refugee and Immigrant News (St. Paul, Minn.), and Southeast Asian Refugee Studies Newsletter (Univ. of Minn.)

The UCI Library subscribes to a limited number of titles for the Archive. These include: Journal of Vietnamese Studies (Australia), Indochina Chronology, Context: Southeast Asians in California, Indochina Newsletter, Horizons of Vietnamese Thought and Experience, Tenderloin Times, Cambodian Community Focus, California Hmong Times, and the Nguoi Viet. The daily Vietnamese edition of Nguoi Viet is housed in Current Periodicals; the weekly English edition is housed in the Archive. Other categories of periodicals are special issues of periodicals, annuals, and periodicals issued on an irregular basis. The Archive usually does not subscribe to these titles, but obtains them as available. Examples are the "Cambodia 1990" issue of *Cultural Survival Quarterly*, business directories, Tet annuals, *Vietnam Forum, Hmong Forum*,

Orange County's first Asian/Pacific American Film and Video Festival will take place May 22 and May 29 at UC Irvine. Funded by a UCI grant, it has been organized in large part by UCI student, Peter Pham.

It concerns the relationship between newly arrived Vietnamese fishermen and the well-established Italian fishing community in Monterey, California. # Asian American Studies at UCI: Progress Report

It was not a traditional Asian Heritage Week at UCI this year. There were no dances, colorful costumes, or music, just the steady beat of Japanese Kaiko drums as a background to militant speeches at a rally protesting lack of action on the part of the UCI administration to start an Asian American Studies program. Over 300 students occupied the chancellor's office on April 22 with their demands. A hunger strike, with students taking daily shifts on a rotating basis, began the following week and could last until the end of the quarter on June 10.

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Asians are the largest single ethnic group on the UCI campus. 43.4% of the undergraduates are of Asian origin, the highest percentage for a university its size outside of Hawaii. Over 52% of the freshman class is Asian, with approximately 29% of those of Southeast Asian origin. Presently, there are Asian American Studies programs on all UC campuses except UC Riverside and UC Irvine.
