Asian American Studies at UCI

It is a pleasure to announce the appointment of Dr. Ketu H. Katrak as the Director of UCI's Asian American Studies program. She comes to UCI after nearly ten years at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst. Dr. Katrak is a Pofessor of Literature, specializing in Asian American Literature, Postcolonial Writers from Africa, India, the Caribbean, and Feminist Theory. Her publications include "South Asian American Writers" in The Cambridge Interethnic Companion to Asian American Literature, Ed. King-Kok Cheung; co-editor of Antifeminism in the Academy (Routledge, 1996), "Desh-Videsh: South Asian Expatriate Writing and Art", a special issue of The Massachusetts Review, XXIX (1988-89). Her poems have appeared in The Penguin Anthology of Contemporary Women Poets Professor Katrak's current research explores the intersections of ethnicities, multiple locations, diasporic politics in Asian American Literature, and the impacts of new immigrants on ethnic formations in the U.S.

Asian American Studies is offering ten courses this Fall, including Asian Pacific American Women's History, The Vietnamese American Experience (SS 178D, Dr. Pham Cao Duong, and Asian Tuesday, 6-9 PM, SSL 140), American Politics. In Winter 1997 twelve courses will be offered, including two new courses in Asian American Film and Video. The program also sponsors a lecture series, and has inaugurated an Asian American Theme House.
